# CMCC Joins Achieving the Dream to Improve Student Success



Central Maine Community College has joined Achieving the Dream (ATD), a network of more than 220 colleges in 39 states dedicated to improving student success. As a Network institution, CMCC will innovate to implement, align, and scale cutting edge reforms, work with ATD coaches to build institutional capacity and connect with peers to foster learning and share information.

"Achieving the Dream is a growing network of more than 220 community colleges committed to helping all students achieve their goals for academic success," noted Betsy Libby, academic dean at CMCC. "The goal is to close academic achievement gaps and accelerate student success by examining data

and building on the College's capacities in seven essential areas, such as leadership and vision, teaching and learning, and data and technology," Libby added.

The Kresge Foundation has awarded an \$810,000 grant to The Foundation for Maine's Community Colleges to enable CMCC and the other Maine community colleges to join the ATD Network. In announcing the award, William F. L. Moses, managing director of The Kresge Foundation's Education Program, noted: "Maine is poised to become a national leader in demonstrating how low-income, first generation and under-represented students can succeed in college. This award is a testament to the

collaborative approach that Maine's community colleges are taking to improve student outcomes, and it recognizes the promising work already underway across the Maine Community College System."

The ATD Network offers a "capacity-building framework" and self-assessment tools that allow colleges to pinpoint strengths and areas for improvement across those seven institutional capacities. The approach integrates and aligns existing college success efforts and offers valuable support in making bold, institution-wide changes.

"The strength of local and regional economies, our ability to rebuild the middle class, and the possibility that a new generation will achieve their goals depends on community colleges," said Dr. Karen A. Stout, president and CEO of Achieving the Dream. "Colleges that join the ATD Network show an exceptional commitment to becoming the kind of institution that will lead the nation into the future."

A team from CMCC met with teams from other colleges in April and June to prepare to launch their ATD work. Colleges in the ATD Network will rely heavily on data that answers critical questions about who attends college, who succeeds and why, and how college is financed. To advance the goals of academic success and social mobility, the colleges will examine data metrics that provide information on how low-income and other underserved students perform. These are categorized into performance metrics, efficiency metrics, and equity metrics at points during the student experience from access through post-college outcomes.

As colleges progress through ATD, they may apply to participate in initiatives that can help them refine practices based on sound evidence of what works. The Center for Digital Education's Digital Community Colleges Survey Awards honor community colleges utilizing technology to engage students and improve learning.

Central Maine Community College is among the topten winners in the 2016-17 Digital Community Colleges Survey conducted by The Center for Digital Education (CDE). Now in its twelfth year, this survey analyzes how community colleges use a range of technologies to improve services to students, faculty, staff, and the community at large.

CMCC placed eighth nationally in the small college category and was the only institution in Maine and one of only two in New England to be selected. "This year's survey indicates community colleges are continuing to improve efforts at creating cost-effective platforms and open-education resources, mobile environments, real-time resources, telepresence robots and more to create robust online and mobile environments for their students," said Dr. Kecia Ray, executive director for the Center for Digital Education.

The survey also revealed insights about community colleges' technology priorities. Colleges surveyed indicated that mobility devices/app support is their top priority in the coming year. Other priorities include website redesign/updates; cybersecurity tools and testing;

and how to integrate technology into curriculum and instructional practices.

We are pleased to be recognized nationally for the exceptional technology support we provide to our students, instructors, and staff," said President Scott Knapp. "Digital technology is now closely tied with a student's learning process and experiences. A college with a sound digital technology infrastructure is better equipped to train students for the high-tech jobs of today and tomorrow," the president added.

As opposed to confining learning and educational experiences to a classroom or library, the successful implementation of digital technology services allows students to experience both independent and cooperative learning advantages.

Instructor and honors coordinator Diana Drown, who accompanied the students on the trip, noted that she and the students were really impressed with the keynote

speaker, Dr. Jim Withers, physician and founder of Operation Safety Net and The Street Medicine Institute, which are both focused on providing healthcare to the homeless. "One of my students recently spoke of him and his organization operation safety net and thought as a community service project for our program we could possibly collect needed items for Operation Safety Net," said Diana.

## CMCC Completes Transfer Agreement with Northeastern University

The College's most recent articulation (transfer) agreement was signed this past spring semester, our first-ever with Northeastern University's College of Professional Studies (CPS). This agreement links CMCC's A.S. in Computer Technology to the B.S. in Information Technology at the world-renowned Boston institution. Students can complete this program entirely online, making it an efficient way to earn a bachelor's degree while entering the workforce with associate degree credentials.

A collaborative effort by Computer Technology Chair Ashley Hayes, Director of Placement and Transfer Services Liz Oken, and a team from Northeastern's CPS, the agreement is another product of the TAACCCT Round 3 "Maine is IT!" grant, designed to enhance technology training statewide through the Maine Community College System. Since that time, a representative from Northeastern's CPS has been on campus each semester for our transfer fairs.

The College now has more than 40 articulation agreements with eight different colleges and universities, with more in process. A complete listing of CMCC's articulation agreements is online.



#### College Receives Generous Gift from Gene Haas Foundation



Congratulations to our own Dave Gonyea, inducted recently into the United States Collegiate Athletic Association (USCAA) Inaugural Hall of Fame. Dave has been with CMCC for 24 years and serves as Director of Athletics, Housing and Security.

According to Matthew Simms, executive director & CEO of the USCAA, Dave and the other inductees were selected "in recognition of their meritorious contributions to the USCAA, seeking to advance the association."

A long-time contributor to the USCAA, Coach Gonyea just finished his 24th season as head coach of the men's basketball team with an impressive 481-219 record over the last twenty-four seasons. Under his leadership, the men have won nine league championships, three New England championships, and participated in 12 NSCAA/USCAA national championship tournaments. In 2002, the Mustangs won the USCAA national championship. Coach led his team to an undefeated season in 2012 (18-0), a Yankee Conference Championship, and a trip to the USCAA National Tournament held in Uniontown, PA.

Gonyea was named 1996-97 New England Coach of the Year, 1998-99 and 2000-01 NSCAA Athletic Director of the Year, 2002 USCAA Athletic Director of the Year, and 1998-99, 1999-00, 2000-01, 2001-02, & 2002-03 MSCC Coach of the Year, as well as the 2007-08, 2013-14, 2015-16, Yankee Conference Coach of the Year.

The iUSCAA Hall of Fame Dinner was held June 11th in Norfolk, Virginia, home of the USCAA National Office where the Hall of Fame will be housed.
